Teaching Input

- Show children the timeline on the slides showing each of the periods we have studied. What can you
 remember about crimes, prevention and punishment in each of these periods? Spend some time
 discussing each period as a class.
- Go through the information on the slides about crime, prevention and punishment today. How is crime and punishment different today to how it was in the past? Where do some of the aspects of modern crime and punishment come from (e.g. judges and juries date all the way back to the Roman period, prisons as punishment is a Victorian idea)? Discuss ideas as a class.
